

There are two pieces of work that you're supposed to do on the book:

- a) **COMPULSORY:** you will have to answer a list of questions about the book itself which may entice carrying out some research about the author, the time in which the book was written, etc. The instructions and the questions themselves will be posted later during the course. But for now you may use the blog in your SUBGRUPO del Avirtual for discussion.
- b) **OPTIONAL:** you may create a Digital Story based on the book itself, part of the book, a book report, your personal opinion about the characters, ETC.

TIPS

that will help you perform a much more effective book report for your oral test on

The Daffodil Mystery

1. Listen to the book at least once so that you get a general idea about the content, plot etc.
2. Listen to it as many times as you need in order to answer more detailed questions about the book itself.
 - **Theme, plot, setting, characters, style;** fair divisions for any essay. Order and emphasis will depend on bias of question.
 - Keep a piece of **notebook** paper next to you while you are listening, so you can take down notes as they come to you during listening.
 - Be sure to write down the chapter numbers that correspond to what you feel is important.
 - Your answers should demonstrate that you have not only read the book but understood and filtered every bit of important information presented in it.

Characters: role of each character in the story. What does each character represent? What do you feel the writer is trying to say about life or society with these characters?

Personal opinion: What have you thought of the book? Everyone that reads a book has a different opinion. Your sharing of your opinion is what makes a book report unique and all its own work.

Evidence: When you make a point - you must prove it. Just as a lawyer in court must produce evidence to support his case, so you must produce evidence to prove the comments you make about characters, relationships, themes, style etc. When you make a point, refer to the text. give an example to support what you say. Better still, use a quote.

Selection: Avoid the trap of just re-telling the story. The important thing is to be selective in the way you use the text. Only refer to those parts of the book that help you to answer the question.

Answer the question: it sounds obvious, but it's so easy to forget the question and go off at a tangent. When you have finished a paragraph read it through and ask yourself. "How does this contribute to answering the question?" If it doesn't, change it so that it does address the question directly.

- As part of the oral exam (for all students PIE and NON_PIE) you will have to prepare an **Audio-book** (the rest of the details about the oral exam will be

provided later).

- The process is the same as you'd do with a printed book. That is, you will have to listen to the book as many times as you need in order to be capable of answering questions about the book itself.
- The book is *The Daffodil Mystery* by Edgar Wallace

Step 1. Listen to the audio book as many times as you need to understand the progress of the story and to be capable of answering questions about the characters, plot, your personal opinion about the situation etc.... i.e., as you'd do with a printed book.


Step 2. Later in the year, around March, I'll post a reading checkup guide to help you out with the understanding of the book and some compulsory questions that you will have to answer and hand it. There will also be a forum available in the AV so that you can comment aspects of the progress of the book.

IMPORTANT

My advice is that you to start listening to the book as soon as possible since I will only be giving you about a week or so to answer the questions once they've been posted. Answering the questions is compulsory and a **requirement** if you want to take the oral exam.
