TRANSPORT

GENERAL INFORMATION

Valencia is a sustainable destination thanks to its excellent public transport network, which connects all the neighbourhoods and tourist areas of interest. Although the size of the city will allow you to walk or cycle to almost any point, for longer distances we recommend the **metro, tram or bus**.

Buses in Valencia City

Taking buses around Valencia will offer you the opportunity to get around the city whilst seeing the sights as you travel. It is important to remember that when you are taking the bus you will need to be reasonably independent - you will not necessarily know when you need to get off the bus so it can be more intimidating than catching the metro-.



If you decide to travel by bus, it is worth considering buying combined tickets that will allow you to take the bus as well as the tram and the metro (see below for more details). The options include the Valencia tourist card or the Integrated Transport Ticket.

The Metro system (underground / subway system) in Valencia City

Valencia's underground system is one of the quickest and easiest ways to get around the city. It is a comfortable way to travel in the summer as there is air conditioning in the carriages.

What is it?

Travel free on city buses (EMT) and metropolitan buses (Metrobus), metro (AB zones, including the airport stop), tram and commuter trains (Renfe) in zone AB.

If you're in Valencia for one, two or three days, the Valencia Tourist Card will help you make the most of your time. It's a physical card you can use to travel around the city by public transport and get into museums and monuments such as La Lonja for free. Want more? It also entitles you to special discounts on numerous attractions, tours, stores, restaurants and much more, and you can even grab a couple of beers and tapas and toast to our health.

How does it work?

Buy your 24-, 48- or 72-hour Valencia Tourist Card online and specify how you want to receive the card. You can pick it up at any of our Tourist Offices or at the digital airport kiosks which are open 24 hours a day, at the Plaza del Ayuntamiento office and at the Joaquín Sorolla station, or have us send it to your hotel or even to your home. Keep in mind that delivery time is 3 to 5 working days in Spain, and 10 to 20 days abroad.

The card will be activated the first time you use it, and it will be valid for 24, 48 or 72 hours after that.

If you prefer to buy tickets online in advance, do so at the same time you buy the Valencia Tourist Card and the discounts will be applied automatically.

METRO and TRAM in Valencia

Valencia’s metro, locally known as Metrovalencia, is the underground metro system in the city. The clean and air-conditioned metro offers a reliable, fast, and economical way to travel within the city centre and the suburbs.

You will find 6 metro lines (Lines 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 9) and 3 tram lines (4, 6, 8) divided between 4 fare zones (A, B, C, and D). Each line will take you in different directions, so it’s best to check the map. The most travelled zone is zone A which surrounds the city centre. We have highlighted some of the main stops for you in zone A below: The airport, the city centre and the beaches. In addition, we have highlighted in red the stop of the University: La Carrasca.

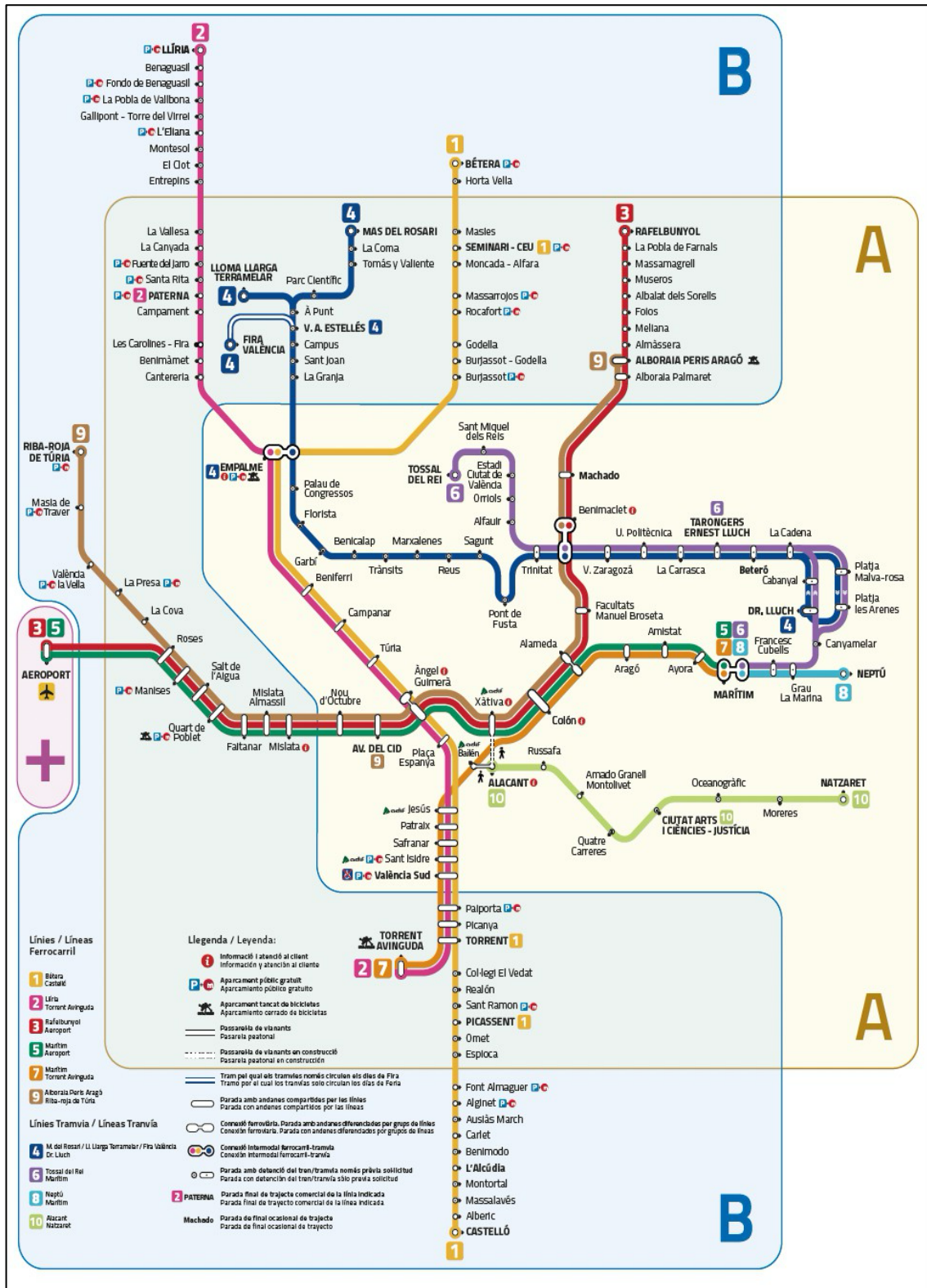

VALENBISI (bicycle)

Valenbisi is the public bicycle rental service in the city of Valencia. The Valenbisi service is offered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, provided that there is no action that prevents the proper functioning of the service.

SHORT TERM SUBSCRIPTION 7 DAYS

If you want to enjoy the city in the most fun way now you can do it, for **13,30 euros** enjoy the Valenbisi service for one week. The first 30 minutes are free, but if you exceed 30 minutes on the same journey, the usual rate will apply: €1.04 for the first hour and €3.12 for each each following hour.

1 DAY TICKET. €3.99

A day in Valencia takes you far. Enjoy unlimited bike rides around the city, with the first 30 minutes of each trip free. If a trip exceeds 30 minutes, the standard rates apply: €1.04 for the first hour and €3.12 for each additional hour. Remember: always park your bike at an official station, never on the street.

PLACES OF INTEREST

1. Ciudad de las Artes y las Ciencias

This is a large leisure complex for scientific and cultural dissemination that began its adventure in 1998 with the inauguration of the Hemisfèric. Located on the Turia riverbed, the City of Arts and Sciences has a surface area of 350,000 square metres and has been conceived as an open city within the great city of Valencia. It was designed by the architect Santiago Calatrava and its interior houses such solid institutions as the Palau de les Arts Reina Sofia, the Hemisfèric (Imax Cinema and Planetarium), the Umbracle (a garden for strolling), the Príncipe Felipe Science Museum, the Oceanogràfic and the Àgora or multifunctional space. This complex is open to the public 365 days a year.

2. Palau de la Música

Music in Valencia has a venue worthy of the emotions it arouses in human beings. The so-called Palau de la Música, located in the Turia Garden, surprises on the outside with an architecture based on iron and glass. As if it were a great greenhouse, it offers a magnificent space to listen to great artists and orchestras, especially classical music. It was inaugurated in 1987 and was designed by José María García Paredes, winner of the National Architecture Prize in 1956. It has an extensive programme, so it is very likely that you will be able to attend a concert during your stay.

3. Ópera de Valencia

Another of the great temples of music in Valencia is the Valencia Opera House or Palau de les Arts Reina Sofia. It forms part of the City of Arts and Sciences complex and looks like the keel of a ship. Let's not forget that it is next to the Turia riverbed. Of course, there are also those who find similarities with the hull of an imperial soldier from 'Star Wars'. But if its exterior is impressive, its interior is also up to the task. It has a 530 m2 stage with a capacity for 1,800 spectators. Other areas of interest are the Aula Magistral, the Amphitheatre and the Martín y Soler Theatre. It is highly recommended to take a guided tour and then stay for lunch in its restaurant.

4. Lonja de la Seda

Declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1996, the Lonja de la Seda or Lonja de los Mercaderes is one of Valencia's emblematic buildings. It dates from the 15th century and is located opposite the Central Market and the Temple of the Santos Juanes. This masterpiece of Valencian civil Gothic architecture occupies a surface area of 2,000 square metres and consists of three sections structured around an orange tree courtyard: the tower, the Consulate of the Sea room and the Contracting room or Column room. The ground floor of the tower houses the chapel of the Immaculate Conception and the two upper floors were used as a prison for merchants who defaulted on their payments. It owes its name to the fact that silk was the city's most prosperous industry from the 14th to the 18th century.

5. Catedral de Valencia

Although its origins are Gothic, the truth is that Valencia Cathedral has accumulated several architectural styles due to successive remodelling. The ground plan of the temple has three naves and next to the Apostles' door the unique Water Tribunal of Valencia still meets every Thursday at 12 noon, an institution whose rulings are scrupulously respected, despite the fact that it is not made up of career judges. The most striking feature of the cathedral complex is the Miguelete bell tower, which is more than 50 metres high and octagonal in shape. The Diocesan Museum can be accessed from inside the cathedral.

6. Mercado Central de Valencia

If you are passionate about gastronomy, you have to visit the Central Market of Valencia, a gourmet paradise of modernist architecture that offers the excellent products of the orchard and the Mediterranean. With 8,000 square metres, it is said to be the largest fresh produce market in Europe. Its structure is made up of stained glass windows, tiles and iron columns that evoke the Eiffel Tower. More than 1,200 stalls are distributed in this space and, if you want to make a "gastro" stop, head for the traditional Central Bar, which is now in the hands of chef Ricard Camarena. Here you can sample typical Valencian food in the form of excellent tapas, raciones and sandwiches.

7. Torres de Serranos

They are a magnificent example of Valencian Gothic architecture. The Serranos Towers were built to defend one of the most used accesses to old Valencia. Their construction began in 1392 and they were exempted in 1865, when the city wall was demolished. From 1586 to 1887 they were used as a prison for nobles. Nowadays, the fallera mayor welcomes Valencia's main festival, the Fallas, from here. This event is known as the Crida and is held on the last Sunday in February.

8. Torres de Quart

The monumental Torres de Quart guard one of the entrances to the old city walls of Valencia. They were built in the mid-15th century, and four master builders were responsible for their construction: Francesc Baldomar, Jaume Pérez, Pere Compte and Pere Bonfill. Its name seems to come from the town of Cuart de Poblet (5 kilometres away), as this gateway led to Cuart de Poblet.



Over time, it has been used for various purposes. In addition to being the guardians of this access to the city, it has been a gunpowder store and a women's prison. Today, it is the perfect place to admire the Valencian skyline from its battlements.

9. Plaza del Ayuntamiento

It is the heart of the city. The Plaza del Ayuntamiento in Valencia is one of the liveliest spaces, not only because it contains the Casa Consistorial and other monumental buildings, but also because it is an emblematic meeting point, as numerous bus lines stop here. Flower stalls are set up in the middle of the square and the typical mascletás are held here during the Fallas.



10. Palacio Maqués de Dos Aguas

It is home to the National Ceramics Museum. The Palace of the Marquis of Dos Aguas has an impressive alabaster façade by the sculptor Vergara. It exhibits a magnificent collection of ceramics of the most diverse origins and recreates some traditional spaces, such as a unique Valencian kitchen.

11. Plaza de la Virgen

It is one of the most beautiful and unique squares in the city. The Plaza de la Virgen de Valencia is located in the heart of the historic centre, in the exact place that the Roman Forum occupied many centuries ago. It is a pedestrian area that invites you to relax and enjoy one of its terraces while you listen to the noise of children and the sound of the water in the fountain. And also to enjoy its monumental buildings. The square is named after the patron saint of Valencia, the Virgen de los Desamparados, whose basilica presides over this large, irregularly shaped space. During the Fallas, a multitudinous offering of flowers is made here in homage to the Virgin. You can also see the doorway of the Apostles of Valencia Cathedral and the Palau de la Generalitat de Valencia.

12. Jardines del Turia

The Turia Gardens are the great respite of Valencia, a place where you can go for a run, meet up with friends or stop off to visit such emblematic spaces as the City of Arts and Sciences. Great architects and landscape designers, including Ricardo Bofill, worked on this great project to restore the banks of the River Turia.

Today, Valencians and visitors can enjoy a 7-kilometre route, divided into 12 sections, with gardens, bridges, ponds, children's areas and terraces for aperitifs.



13. Mercado de Colón

Located in the heart of the Ensanche district, just a few streets from the Town Hall square, the Mercado de Colón offers the largest concentration of gastronomic spaces in Valencia in a modernist building dating from 1916. A gastromarket where you can find local products, typical Valencian products or terraces with authentic Valencian horchata, together with a wide range of restaurants where you can enjoy the best raw materials prepared by avant-garde chefs. A place where you can enjoy a typical Valencian drink, the Valencian horchata, in "Daniel". It is also sometimes possible to attend gastronomy courses, live music or gastronomic events.

14. Oceanogràfic

It is the largest aquarium in Europe with more than 45,000 animals of 500 different species swimming in salt water pumped from the Malvarrosa beach. The Oceanogràfic, built in 2003 by the architects Félix Candela and José María Tomás Llavador, was conceived to represent the main marine ecosystems of the planet. It is part of the City of Arts and Sciences of Valencia.

SOME NEIGHBOURHOODS

1. Barrio del Carmen

Bordered by the Torres de Serranos and the Torres de Quart, this is the area with the most history in the city. Valencia's Barrio del Carmen owes its name to the church and convent of Carmen Calzado and, as we enter its heart, we are treated to a labyrinth of narrow cobbled streets. Here you will find the unique Portal de la Valldigna, the century-old Plaza del Árbol and the tiny Casa de los Gatos, as well as traditional shops that are hundreds of years old.

This "chic" and bohemian area is also home to important art centres, such as the IVAM, the Museum of Illustration (MUVIM) and the Centre del Carme or the Beneficencia. It is a highly coveted destination for foodies, as, in addition to its famous Mossen Sorell Market, it has numerous restaurants and terraces. Don't forget to try the paella.

2. Ruzafa and Ensanche

The Ruzafa neighbourhood is one of those examples found in many cities where the suburbs are beginning to attract bohemians, artists, bookshops, design studios and alternative gastronomic establishments. It is very interesting to visit this neighbourhood that concentrates the essence of the past and the new trends. What many consider "the hipster quarter" has a history that goes back to the 9th century, when Prince Abd-Allah Al-Balansi commissioned an Arab garden to be built here. More recently, it became an independent municipality in the 19th century.

A visit to Valencia has to include Ruzafa in its itinerary because it allows for original shopping, visiting design galleries, visiting the municipal market and eating in magnificent restaurants and cafés.

3. Cabanyal District, Beaches and La Marina

This area is ideal for enjoying Valencian gastronomy with the sea breeze and spectacular views. It includes the Marina de València, a cutting-edge area with wide spaces for walking, cycling, enjoying the local cuisine and practising nautical and sporting activities; the beaches of Cabanyal and Malvarrosa, with their promenade and the seaside neighbourhood of Cabañal, which is particularly fashionable for its lifestyle.

It is a large area, with a wide range of leisure and restaurants, so we recommend that you visit it in good time. You can take a swim in the beach, go for a bike ride, taste the authentic Valencian paella or enjoy the lively atmosphere of the terraces by the sea.

4. Benimaclet

Benimaclet is an alternative neighbourhood in Valencia, a multicultural neighbourhood where you can still breathe the essence of the village it was not so long ago.

A neighbourhood with a very marked personality that revolves around the Plaza de la Iglesia, from where pedestrian streets of typical houses, walls decorated with graffiti and constantly changing ephemeral murals emerge.

During the day, the small traditional shops are still very active throughout the neighbourhood, but every night the lively university atmosphere can be felt in every corner of Benimaclet.

What to do in Benimaclet? Visit BenimacletWalk through its streets, breathe in its essence and let yourself be carried away by the casual atmosphere.

A lively neighbourhood, with lots of young people, full of cafés, bars, terraces, cafés-bookshops and the occasional discotheque, as well as an intense cultural life, ranging from learning to dance swing and sevillanas, cooking workshops or language exchange, to live concerts and monologues, photographic exhibitions and cultural activities of all kinds.

MUSEUMS

1. Valencian Institute of Modern Art - IVAM

The Instituto Valenciano de Arte Moderno (IVAM) is one of Valencia's main museums.

Located very close to the historic centre, it has two permanent exhibitions of the artists Julio González and Ignacio Pinazo, as well as temporary exhibitions that delve into various contemporary artistic disciplines (painting, photography, design, sculpture, installations, etc.).

2. Museo de Bellas Artes de Valencia (Museum of Fine Arts)

Located in the Colegio Seminario San Pío V, a building founded in 1683 by the Archbishop of Valencia Fray Juan Tomás de Rocabertí, inside which a Renaissance courtyard of the former palace of Ambassador Vich is preserved, the Fine Arts Museum of Valencia is one of the most important art galleries in Spain.

Its collection includes examples of local heritage of great historical and artistic relevance, such as a collection of Valencian Gothic panels from the 14th and 15th centuries, as well as works by Goya, El Greco, Pinazo, Sorolla and Velázquez.

Highlights include the "Triptych of the Last Judgement" by Vrancke van der Stockt, the "Martyrdom of St James the Less" by Pedro Orrente, the "Self- portrait" by Velázquez and the "Virgin and Child with Donor" by Pinturicchio.

3. Bancaja Foundation

Located in the Plaza de Tetuán, the Bancaja Foundation has become one of the great exhibition engines of the city of Valencia. With a private collection that totals more than 2,800 works, great names such as Pablo Picasso and Joaquín Sorolla are some of the mainstays of its project, in addition to others such as Miquel Navarro, Antonio Saura, Julian Opie and Sean Scully, among others.

It is in the imposing building that houses the foundation where its exhibition proposal is presented, which brings together great figures of national and international art, an offer to which is added a battery of activities, including conferences and concerts.

4. Museum of Natural Sciences

Despite not being one of the most eye-catching museums, the Natural Sciences Museum of Valencia exhibits valuable palaeontological pieces, such as its collection of American mammals from the Pleistocene, possibly the most important in Europe.

Located in the Viveros Gardens, in beautiful surroundings, this centre also houses fossils, insects and a section that traces life and evolution in Valencian ecosystems.

5. Príncipe Felipe Science Museum

The Príncipe Felipe Science Museum, which is defined by its didactic nature. Inside, different subjects related to science, technology and the evolution of life are dealt with from an educational point of view, with exhibitions such as Foucault's pendulum or the artistic representation of DNA that will not leave children or adults indifferent.

6. Cathedral Museum - La Almoina Archaeological Centre

Valencia Cathedral is a place full of secrets. Inside there is a museum, founded in 1761, where the Holy Chalice is kept, as well as other works by great masters of painting, such as Francisco de Goya.

Behind the Cathedral is the La Almoina Archaeological Centre, a space where you can learn about the origins of our city, Roman Valentia, founded in the 2nd century BC.

Considered one of the best archaeological centres in Europe, La Almoina preserves part of the ancient Roman streets and a large catalogue of buildings from that period, as well as a Visigothic baptistry and the remains of the Muslim fortress.

7. Fallas Museum

Valencia and the Fallas have an indissoluble relationship. It is therefore not unusual for the city to dedicate one of its most important museums to the Fallas and its artists.

The Fallas Museum of Valencia is located in the Plaza de Monteolivete, in a former convent.

It currently houses and exhibits the ninots that have been pardoned since 1934, as well as posters, programmes and photographs related to this popular festival.

If you are interested in this part of Valencian culture and folklore, on Avenida Sant Josep Artesà you will find the Fallas Artists' Museum, where you can see original sketches and models of the Fallas, portraits of the Falleras Mayores of Valencia or rewards and badges of Fallas commissions.

8. El Carmen Cultural Centre - CCCC

The Centre del Carme Cultura Contemporània (CCCC) is an exhibition space dedicated to contemporary art (plastic arts, experimental dance, micro-theatre, performance, cinema, music, sound art, design, comics, publishing, etc.) with a clear vindictive and avant-garde character.

Located in Calle Museo, next to the Iglesia del Carmen, the building is a former convent closely linked to art.

At the end of the 19th century it was the headquarters of the Royal Academy of Fine Arts of San Carlos, the Fine Arts Museum of Valencia and the warehouse of the Artistic Treasure of the National Heritage during the Spanish Civil War, housing some of the main works of the Prado Museum during the conflict.

Today the CCCC hosts exhibitions, cycles and festivals.

9. Hortensia Herrero Art Centre – CAHH

The Hortensia Herrero Art Centre was created in 2023 with a dual purpose: to share with society the most exciting contemporary art at the international level and to contribute to making the Comunitat Valenciana a leading cultural and artistic destination.

This venue brings together the private collection of its patron Hortensia Herrero, one of Spain's leading collectors of contemporary art. The collection includes works by artists such as Anselm Kiefer, Georg Baselitz, David Hockney, Anish Kapoor and Mat Collishaw, among others. Some of these artists have created specific works that will occupy specific spaces in the Art Centre.

10. Botanical Garden

The Botanical Garden of the University of Valencia is a living museum located in the historical centre of the city which is open to the public and aims to let people connect with the plant world by fostering its study, teaching, dissemination and conservation, as well as its sustainable use. Among other objectives, the Garden maintains a scientific collection of live plants, preserving a historic legacy of continuous cultivation, which includes monumental trees and historical buildings. Furthermore, it has the responsibility of maintaining the tradition of botanical gardens in Valencia, which date back to the 16th Century, when the university created a physics garden for the purpose of teaching medicine.

Beneath its cloak of vegetation, which extends over approximately 4 hectares, we can travel to each of the continents, imagining exotic or far-off places, or seeing close-up the plants that inhabit our Mediterranean countryside, all of which serve to remind us of the great biodiversity housed on our planet. This is a wonderfully rich plant world that we are discovering more and more thanks to botanists such as those who work in our Garden; those who participate in different investigation projects centred on the conservation of rare, endemic or threatened plant species of the Mediterranean, the conservation of natural habitats, and the knowledge of plant diversity.
