

DECALOGUE OF ACTION AGAINST FRAUDULENT PRACTICES IN THE CONDUCT OF EXAMS AT THE FACULTAT D'ECONOMIA OF THE UNIVERSITAT DE VALÈNCIA (May 11, 2026)

1. Academic fraud is defined as any deliberate behaviour intended to falsify the results of an examination or assignment, whether one's own or someone else's, in order to pass a subject or improve one's grade unfairly.
2. Teaching staff are responsible for identifying enrolled students at the entrance to the classroom. Students must present one of the following forms of identification: national identity card, student card, driving licence or passport.
3. Once the examination has begun, teaching staff will decide whether to admit latecomers. However, they will allow latecomers into the examination room during the first fifteen minutes after the official start time, unless any students have already left.
4. You must familiarise yourself with the exam conditions, as set out in the Teaching Guide and the official announcement published by the department.
5. You must also always follow the teaching staff's instructions in the classroom. Students will be informed of which materials and objects they can and cannot use, and the conditions for their use. In particular, they must not use mobile phones or any other unauthorised electronic devices. Any materials or objects that cannot be used during the exam must be stored at a sufficient distance away, as determined by the teacher.
6. Failure to comply with the provisions of Section 5 may result in expulsion from the classroom and an automatic fail (zero). To ensure that there are no devices in the classroom transmitting and receiving signals, the teachers in charge will use a specific wireless signal detector.
7. If any form of cheating or fraud is detected during the examination, the teaching staff will ask the person involved to hand in their work and any related materials. They will also inform them that their work will be marked as failed and that they will be expelled from the classroom.
8. If evidence of fraudulent practice relevant to the examination's grading is discovered during the marking process that was not apparent at the time of completion (for instance, if a high degree of similarity is identified between an exercise and a published text or another individual's work), the examination may be awarded a zero grade, accompanied by a justification.
9. Students are required to participate in the assessment process in a manner that respects the principles of equality and authenticity, and they must refrain from engaging in or collaborating on fraudulent activities.
10. Any form of academic fraud in an assessment is considered a serious offence. Following a report of the incident and the opening of disciplinary proceedings, sanctions will be issued.
