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SUMMARY

The subject *Contemporary Social Structure* is a compulsory, 6 ECTS credit subject that takes place in the third academic year of the degree in Social Work. Together with *General Sociology* and *Methods and Techniques in Social Investigation*, it makes up the core subject Sociology.

This subject intends to offer students a strict vision of the stratification and social inequality systems, with special attention to the contemporary societies that make up the current system-world and especially on the position of Spain within this system. Special focus will be on inequality processes at a global scale, where analytical units of the system are not only individuals, families or classes but the nations themselves.

Understanding of the basic concepts is especially relevant for the analysis of the social structure understood as a system, based on the different theoretical perspectives that explain the social stratification and inequality. Meaningful empirical data will also be used to allow an adequate understanding of these dimensions, key for the analysis of social reality.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

1. The concept of social structure

The macro-sociological perspective within social sciences. The concepts of social structure and social system. Dialogical duality between structure and social action. Strategic structural processes and resistance.



2. Stratification Social Systems

Social structure, inequality and stratification. The different stratification systems: underlying domination logic and process of legitimacy. Main stratification factors in contemporary societies. Unequal distribution of social resources and domination relations.

3. The different fields in the analysis of Social Structure

The field demographic and the families, the economic field, the political field and the cultural field. Interdependencies and contemporary trends in the local and global level.

4. Main factors of social stratification: the analysis of the social classes

Classical theories on social stratification: Karl Marx, a critical perspective on conflict; Max Weber, a multidimensional perspective on conflict. Modern stratification theories: the functional approach to social stratification; the critical theory of E.O. Wright; the theory of conflict of R. Dahrendorf. Mobility and class reproduction. Stratification factors: gender, cultural origin (ethnic group, immigration), age, etc.

5. Inequality and global stratification

Main theories about inequality and global stratification. The system of global stratification: centre, semi-periphery and periphery. Domination, conflict and centre hegemony: competition between the different capitalist models. The new global classes.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The teaching methodology will combine theoretical and practical training activities, tutoring and those that include study, evaluation and, in general, individual and team work of the students. The activities will be the following:

- Participative master lesson.
- Exhibition-type activities: theoretical exhibitions, seminars, presentation of works.
- Practical activities: role-playing, case resolution, computer applications, workshops.
- Collaborative work / teamwork of the students.
- Individual, group and / or virtual tutoring.

EVALUATION

The evaluation will be carried out in a cumulative and weighted manner using the following instruments:

- WRITTEN TEST to check the organization of ideas, application of analysis and critical reflexivity linked to the contents of the subject. It will have a weighting between 5 and 7 in the final grade. The exam must be passed in order for the evaluation of the practical activities to be taken into account for the calculation of



the final mark for the course.

- EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC WORK AND EXERCISES OF ANALYSIS, DEBATE AND CRITICAL REFLECTION AND ATTENDANCE TO COMPLEMENTARY TRAINING ACTIVITIES. It will consist of teamwork aimed at fostering the development of abilities to search for meaningful information and critical thinking. This section will also include carrying out exercises in the classroom based on different written and audiovisual materials, etc. tending to favor the learning process. Together they will have a weighting between 3 and 5 in the final grade. the practical activities not carried out or failed cannot be resubmitted at the second sitting because they are part of the continuous assessment of the subject.

The students who do not obtain the approved of the subject in the first call, will be able to present themselves to the second following also these criteria. In the second call it will not be necessary to repeat the academic works or exercises already carried out throughout the semester.

We remind you that:

Plagiarism is "the act of dishonesty at the time of substantially copying other people's works presenting them as their own" (Reducindo et al., 2017, p. 300).
