SUMMARY

This subject forms part of the "TRANSLATION PRACTICE" module, which (with 72 credits) constitutes the practical core of the Translation and Interlinguistic Mediation programme. The module includes different subjects: GENERAL TRANSLATION (30 credits), SPECIALISED TRANSLATION (18 credits), INTERPRETING (12 credits) and KNOWLEDGE OF THE PROFESSIONAL ENVIRONMENT (12 credits).

The subject "Specialised Translation Language B (German) 2/A Spanish/Catalan" is the second of the three that make up the subject "Specialised Translation". The main objective is to familiarise students with some of the text types typical of a scientific-technical field of knowledge, as well as to optimise the resources acquired in the General Translation subjects so that they can be applied appropriately to the translation of specialised texts.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

Unit 1. Introduction to textual linguistics

In this unit, texts will be presented as complete units of communication whose meaning goes beyond the sum of the sentences that compose them. During the unit, students will be invited to reflect on different intra- and extratextual pragmatic parameters that contribute to create the meaning of the text. We will work with texts from the bio-health field.

Unit 2. Introduction to health sciences

In this unit students will acquire some basic notions about the human body, its functions and some pathologies that can affect them. During the development of the sessions dedicated to this unit students will acquire the necessary knowledge of the biosanitary field to be able to understand the texts they will have to translate.

Unit 3. Translation tools: TAO (Dejà Vu X3), terminology databases

During the development of this unit, students will become familiar with the use of CAT tools, such as translation memories or terminology databases, which will allow them to carry out their work in a more efficient, precise and coherent way.

Learning outcomes:

Appreciate and understand the application of different translational standards according to different socio-cultural contexts.

Distinguish and use appropriately the different translation techniques.

To value the differences between language systems and language use for the purposes of translational praxis and interlinguistic mediation.

Make decisions and evaluate them critically in translation or communicative mediation.

Mastery of the most relevant auxiliary means depending on the type of texts to be translated, especially those related to new information and communication technologies, and those related to documentation and the use or elaboration of lexicographic and terminological bases.

Knowledge and appreciation of intercultural differences related to the subject areas to be translated.

To know and understand, within the scope of the degree, the inequalities based on sex and gender in



society; to integrate the different needs and preferences based on sex and gender in the design of solutions and problem solving.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The planned training activities include classroom-based classes of an eminently practical nature, in which the following will be carried out:

- translation exercises of the proposed texts;
- computer-assisted translation in a multimedia environment;
- use of databases and terminology;
- specialized bilingual knowledge in one or more scientific/technical fields.

This course will also involve teamwork, known as a translation project, in which students will take on different roles: translator, documentalist, terminologist, editor, and proofreader. Priority will be given to the formation of working groups that include native speakers of languages A and B.

In this course, the PIEE 2026–27 project, "From Awareness to Action in Social Inclusion: An Interdisciplinary Teaching Proposal for Cross-Curricular Learning," will be carried out, where applicable.

This course promotes UNESCO's sustainable development goals by addressing issues related to several of



them in translation, analysis, and text discussion tasks. In particular, SDG 3, "Good health and well-being," SDG 4, "Quality education," SDG 5, "Gender equality," SDG 16, "Peace, justice, and strong institutions," and SDG 17, "Partnerships for the goals."

EVALUATION

FIRST CALL

The evaluation will consist of three parts:

1. Delivery of weekly translations: 25% recoverable.
2. Team work: 25% recoverable
3. Translation exam: 50% recoverable

A grade of 5 in the final translation test is required to pass the course.

Class attendance is not compulsory, but it is compulsory to hand in the practical assignments. This will be done through the virtual classroom on the date and in the manner indicated by the professor. Late submission of an assignment will result in a penalty in the grade for this section of the evaluation.

SECOND CALL

Those students who have not handed in the weekly translations or have failed the team work or the first translation exam will be examined of all parts in the final exam of the second call.
