SUMMARY

After a brief theoretical introduction to the formal analysis of the lyric text, different thematic blocks of the German lyric will be presented. For this purpose, the most significant authors, their main formal and thematic characteristics as well as the socio-cultural environment will be studied.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

1. Introduction

The course begins with a general overview of the development of lyrical texts in the history of German literature, as well as a reflection on the specific nature of poetic language and the formal and stylistic features of the lyric genre. Basic tools for textual analysis are introduced, such as meter, rhythm, poetic imagery, and rhetorical figures, along with key concepts from lyric theory. The aim of this first unit is to equip students with the skills needed for attentive, sensitive, and technically grounded readings of poetic texts in the German language.



2. Liebeslyrik

Through a selection of love poems ranging from Baroque lyric to contemporary manifestations, this unit analyzes the thematic and formal conventions of Liebeslyrik, as well as its transformations over time. Special attention is given to the treatment of subjectivity, desire, the body, and otherness in the poetic expression of love.

3. Politische Lyrik

This unit explores poetry as a medium for intervention in social and political discourse. Texts from different historical periods—ranging from the Enlightenment to the post-1945 period and the present—are studied with a focus on the poem's critical, testimonial, or activist functions. The course analyzes how lyric poetry responds to specific historical contexts and how it puts into tension the relationship between aesthetics and political commitment.

4. Naturlyrik

Based on examples from various historical periods, this unit examines the poetic representation of nature and its evolution: from Romantic contemplation to contemporary ecological discourse. It offers space for reflection on the human being's place in the natural world and on the symbolic and cultural dimensions that nature assumes in poetry.

5. Philosophische Lyrik

This unit focuses on poems that articulate existential, epistemological, or metaphysical questions through poetic means. Through the analysis of philosophical lyric, it examines how the poem becomes a space for reflection on being, time, language, or death, and how the boundaries between poetic discourse and abstract thought are shifted or challenged.

6. Geschichtslyrik

In this final unit, the poetic representation of historical events and processes of collective memory is analyzed. Attention is given to how poems construct narratives of the past, engage in public debates about history, or propose forms of mourning, testimony, and reparation. Lyric poetry is examined here as a medium that condenses historical experiences and generates alternative forms of knowledge.

By the end of the course, students will be able to analyze poetic texts in the German language from formal, thematic, and historical perspectives. They will develop tools to critically interpret different types of poetry and to situate them within their cultural and philosophical contexts. Additionally, they will be able to articulate coherent and nuanced arguments about the aesthetic and semantic effects of lyrical language, and to establish connections between poems and broader social or existential issues. The course encourages an active approach to poetic texts, grounded in close reading, interpretive sensitivity, and



critical reflection.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

In the **theoretical classes** we will use a hybrid model combining the expository and the communicative didactic model. The expository model uses explanatory methods that focus on showing the interdependence between concepts and facts, and include the repeated use of different skills. The focus is on conceptual content and basic skills are emphasised. Verbal interaction between teacher and student is fundamental. In the **communicative didactic model**, the teacher guides the students through methods of dialogue, discussion and problem solving in a climate of peer interaction. The student learns empirically in relation and interdependence with the teacher and the rest of the classmates, sharing perceptions and ideas about reality and collectively reconstructing knowledge. Learning is centred on discovery, understanding the logic of the subject matter and the social, cultural and ethical problems that derive from it.

In the **practical classes**, this methodology will be complemented with the transactive didactic model, that is to say, use will be made of the didactic resources and technological means available (Virtual Classroom, Internet...) for self-learning. This model focuses on the students' interests, guiding their academic and personal growth. The student explores and discovers the subject guided by their own interest through interaction with the material and human environment, working individually or in small groups tutored by the teacher and often in a self-instructive way. In this way, learning to learn skills are promoted and interdisciplinarity is fostered.

Our intention, among others, is to foster literary appreciation and the capacity for reasoned argumentation. To this end, we will try to transmit the specific mechanisms of literary discourse in its variety and complexity, to be able to appreciate the relationship between text and meaning, its belonging to generic coordinates, as well as its location in a specific historical, social and cultural dimension. Theoretical and practical classes as well as assignments and other exercises to be carried out by the student will serve this



purpose.

Other activities such as attendance at seminars, readings, performances, conferences or courses, dedicated to different artistic fields, will complement aspects of the syllabus.

This course is part of the **Consolidated Educational Innovation Project INNOVA-TEA** (UV-SFPIE_PIEC-2735478) and follows the activities approved by the SFPIE of the UV.

This subject takes particular account of SDG 5 and SDG 16, as the selection of the works in the syllabus has been made according to criteria based on gender equality and the reinforcement of democratic values and social justice.
