SUMMARY

Catalan Morphology is a compulsory second-year course included in the module *Advanced Training in the Catalan Language and its Literary Culture*, and forms part of the subject area *Catalan Language Grammar and Applications in Language Consultancy*. The course focuses on grammatical inflection (nominal, pronominal and verbal) and word formation, paying particular attention to diatopic variation and the standard language models it produces. In addition to being part of the Degree in Catalan Philology, this course is also included in the Minor in Catalan Philology.

The main objectives of the course are:



- To understand the concepts related to morphological units and processes.
- To become familiar with key aspects of Catalan inflection and the organisation of inflectional paradigms.
- To be able to segment words into morphological units and identify the internal structure of words.
- To describe the form of clitic pronouns and the morphophonological processes that affect them.
- To be able to infer and systematise formal and semantic changes that occur in inflection and in the creation of new words.
- To explore normative aspects related to morphology in greater depth.

PREVIOUS KNOWLEDGE

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER SUBJECTS OF THE SAME DEGREE

There are no specified enrollment restrictions with other subjects of the curriculum.

OTHER REQUIREMENTS

To gain the best advantage of this course, it is advisable to be proficient in Catalan language, regard linguistic norms, an awareness of the importance of the standard language, the ability to produce formal and written texts, the capacity to relate Catalan to other Romance and non-Romance languages, and the ability to solve autonomously grammatical and discourse-related problems

Learning outcomes

- Master and be able to apply the general concepts of morphological analysis.
- Distinguish the general rules that determine gender and number.
- Describe the grammatical categories of pronouns.
- Evaluate verbal categories and identify the main irregularities found in verb conjugation.
- Analyse the morphological processes involved in the creation of new words.
- Understand and describe the main features of the morphological variation found in standard language varieties across different geographical areas.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The course content will be introduced starting from the students' prior knowledge, and students are expected to participate actively throughout the learning process.

The course will consist of two weekly theoretical-practical sessions in the classroom, held on two different days. For these sessions, lecturers will provide students with a working dossier.

Theoretical classes:

Before each topic is introduced, students must read the bibliography indicated by the lecturer in order to participate actively in the theoretical sessions and raise any questions or points for clarification.

Practical classes:

The practical sessions will involve applying the concepts covered to empirical data and carrying out exercises related to the course material. The lecturer will discuss with students any problems or difficulties that arise.



Compulsory readings:

At the start of the course, the lecturer will specify the excerpts from the core bibliography (see below) that students are required to read in preparation for certain parts of the course content.

Compulsory practical work:

Throughout the course, students will complete a series of activities designed to consolidate their knowledge of inflectional morphology (especially verbal morphology) and the use and combination of clitic pronouns.

Additionally, students will carry out a practical assignment on one of the course topics chosen from a list provided by the lecturers at the start of the semester.

Independent study, preparation and examinations:

As for the remaining non-classroom hours specified under the ¿Workload¿ section, students should dedicate this time to preparing for the final written exam.

Finally, it should be noted that lecturers and students will use the Virtual Classroom platform and email to communicate updates, details about practical assignments, and other course-related information. In addition, individual or small-group tutorials may be scheduled when needed to address specific questions or issues.

As part of the series *Les autores i els autors a les aules* (Writers in the Classroom), sessions with invited speakers may also be organised. At the beginning of the teaching period, students will be informed about any complementary activities planned and how these may affect the teaching and assessment of the course.

EVALUATION



Student learning will be assessed on the basis of two main components:

1) Practical activities (30% of the final grade):

1.1) Reinforcement activities and active participation in class, worth up to 15%.

1.2) A practical assignment, worth up to 15%.

2) A final written test (70% of the final grade). This will be a multiple-choice exam designed to assess both theoretical and practical knowledge, as well as the acquisition of general and specific competences. The test will include theoretical questions and/or the analysis of texts in which students must apply their morphological knowledge.

In order to pass the course, students must obtain at least 4.5 out of 10 on the final multiple-choice exam. Due to its in-person nature, the 15% corresponding to reinforcement activities and active participation in class is not recoverable in the second exam session for students who did not complete these activities during the semester.

In both the written assignment and the final test, students must demonstrate a good command of formal language and grammatical norms. According to the criteria established by the Board of the Department of Catalan Philology, any spelling or grammatical mistakes that violate standard language norms will result in a fail (no pass), regardless of the content score.

Intellectual honesty is essential within academic communities and for the fair assessment of student work. All work submitted on this course must be original. Simply replacing cohesive elements (such as connectors) or using synonyms in a source text does not prevent the result from constituting plagiarism. Assignments that involve fraudulent collaboration or are composed with the help of artificial intelligence tools (such as ChatGPT or others) will not be accepted, unless such use is part of the course content and has been explicitly authorized by the teaching staff.



The general grading system will follow the regulations of the Universitat de València as approved by the Governing Council on 30 May 2017 (ACGUV 108/2017).
