SUMMARY

The course belongs to the Minor in East Asian Languages and Literatures. It is a prerequisite to have



previously taken the General Philological Training module, i.e. Chinese Language 1 and East Asian Literatures 1. This course aims to broaden students' literary knowledge and enhance their intercultural competence. This course is intended to help students complete their knowledge of East Asian literary traditions with an interdisciplinary and integrative approach that takes into account the linguistic, historical, ideological, philosophical, religious, literary, and stylistic bases of the major East Asian cultures. The course will focus on the intellectual-proto-religious literature of East Asia, reaching the present day, and individual and/or team work will be encouraged in order to develop the student's creativity and critical capacity.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The teaching and learning methodology comprises face-to-face and non-face-to-face activities:

- (a) Face-to-face activities: they account for 40% of the workload. They are divided into theoretical and



practical classes. In the theoretical classes, knowledge about the most relevant literature related to the intellectual traditions linked to East Asia will be transmitted to guide the student in the preparation of his work. The student will have to read several texts related to the explanations, consult the necessary bibliographical sources and carry out the programmed activities. The practical classes will consist of the commentary of texts, debates and thematic expositions complementary to the theoretical content developed.

(b) Non-attendance activities: they represent 60% of the workload. They consist of individual and/or group work on literary works or literary criticism texts related to Asian intellectual literature. It will be necessary to support these works bibliographically, to read critically related texts and to elaborate in a reflexive way the contents dealt with.

EVALUATION

The evaluation of the subject LITERATURE of ASIA ORIENTAL 2 is composed of four interrelated, non-exclusive and all of them complementary and compulsory evaluable elements:

1. Attendance to theoretical classes of generic and transversal content, and of open and participative debates, as well as control tests by blocks.(25%).
2. Exposure by the students of related contents from thematic texts completed by an extension and exposition task that will test their research skills and their skills of dissemination, development and defense of literary theories. For such work it is recommended to pay attention to the author's biography, the context of the work or question analyzed and its final development. (25%)
3. Passing of a control test of the contents of the expositions and presentation of a review of a compulsory reading (25%).
4. Presentation of a final work commentary of that obligatory reading freely chosen of Indian, Chinese, Korean or Japanese literature being able to be either one of the recommended works or another one agreed with the teacher. This work will be in the format of a research paper and may be structured as the content of the above-mentioned exhibition or other, by agreement with the professor (25%).

All papers must be original, with sufficient bibliographic contribution and plagiarism will not be admitted. Failure to follow the Continuous Evaluation, offers the possibility of passing the official final exam together with the presentation of a personal paper of a reading agreed with the professor (50%-50%).
