COORDINATION

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SUMMARY

This course is part of the Bachelor's Degree in Political Science and Public Administration and is taught as a compulsory subject in the second year. Its aim is to understand how collective actors organise, mediate and represent citizens' demands and ideologies. It also analyses the evolution of these collective actors—political parties, interest groups and social movements—and how organisational, institutional and political factors affect interest mobilisation and shape repertoires of collective action.

The course examines in detail the evolution of organisational models of political parties, their programmatic and ideological definition, types of party systems and their institutional and political consequences, types of interest groups and their influence strategies, and types of social movements and



their protest repertoires and available resources. These topics are approached through major institutionalist, sociological and economic theories applied to collective action and collective political actors.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The transmission and acquisition of knowledge will be carried out, in the first place, through the master class. The teacher will explain the essential contents of each of the topics, bringing them closer to reality through the use of current examples, the use of classic texts, cases, legal texts, online materials, etc. The active participation of the students will be demanded at all times. Students will be required to previously prepare the topics that will be discussed in class through study and autonomous work. Similarly, students are expected to spend some time outside the classroom reviewing the content of each of the lectures. Throughout the course, various practical activities will be carried out, both individually and collectively. To do this, students must use materials provided by the teacher or search for them in institutions, libraries, the Internet, etc. The activities carried out in class will require the prior preparation of the various study topics, as well as the consultation of the complementary materials that the teacher may indicate. The exercises of the practical activities must be delivered on the date determined for it, without accepting their reception outside the stipulated period.

EVALUATION

The assessment of the course consists of two components, both in the first and second examination periods.

a) Final exam: At the end of the course, a comprehensive final exam will be administered covering all the



contents included in this course guide, whether or not they have been taught in class, as well as the materials used in the various sessions. This exam will account for 60% of the final grade.

b) Continuous assessment: Throughout the semester, students will complete practical assignments and complementary activities of various types, which must be submitted on the date indicated by the instructor. This component will account for up to 40% of the final grade. To obtain points from continuous assessment, students must attend at least 80% of the class sessions dedicated to it. Furthermore, in order to add the continuous-assessment grade (from practical sessions) to the final exam grade, students must obtain at least 4 out of 10 on the final exam. The content of all continuous-assessment assignments also forms part of the course material and may therefore be included in the final exam. The instructor will explain how each assignment must be completed and submitted, and will provide the results of the practical activities before the exam. Practical assignments—whether not completed or not submitted by the deadline, or already completed or graded—cannot be retaken after the submission date.

In the second examination period, students who did not pass the course in the first period may either keep the grade obtained for the evaluable practical assignments completed during the semester (up to 40% of the final grade, taking only the general second-period exam) or take an additional test to be assessed on the recoverable part of those in-class assignments. When publishing the first-period grades, the instructor will announce whether there are recoverable assignments (and in what form, with what content, and with what percentage value). To add the grade from this additional test (and/or the grade from the practical assignments completed during the semester) to the general second-period exam grade, students must obtain at least 4.0 out of 10 on that exam.

Students who have followed continuous assessment and have been evaluated accordingly, but do not attend the final exam on the official exam date (in either the first or second period), will receive the grade Not Presented. This corresponds to the original line: "El alumnado que haya seguido la evaluación continua... obtendrá la calificación de No Presentado."

The teaching staff responsible for the course may, with due justification, modify the format of the final exam if required to administer it on a date different from the official one, in accordance with the regulations on exam-date conflicts of the University of Valencia or any other legally established cause (e.g., justified force majeure). In such cases, the new exam format must maintain the same level of demand and difficulty as the exam taken by the rest of the group.
